

Book Title: Giraffes Can't Dance

Story Summary:

Gerald the giraffe loves to dance, but his legs are too skinny and his neck is too long. At the Jungle Dance, the warthogs waltz, the chimps cha-cha, and the lions tango. "Giraffes can't dance," they all jeer when it's Gerald's turn to prance. But with some sound advice from a wise cricket, Gerald starts swaying to his own sweet tune.

Story Facts:

- 2. Gerald could finally dance because he found music he loved
- 3. Story is about "Finding your own tune or being yourself"
- 4. The other jungle animals made fun of Gerald for how he danced
- 5. As a result, it made him give up until he got a motivational talk

- 2. He grew up in London, UK
- 3. He attended: Worcester College, Oxford, Eton College, University of Oxford
- 4. He is a British poet, greeting card writer, and children's book writer
- 5. The illustrator who helped with the story used colorful watercolor to make the animals come alive

Story Introduction:

I will tell the students that since it is safari week, we are going to be reading a book about a giraffe that can't dance. I will tell them the book title, author, and illustrator. I will ask them what Gerald finally was able to do and what other animals tey saw in the story

Story Stretching Questions:

- 1. Have you ever felt shy about dancing before like Gerald?
- 2. What is your favorite animal?
- 3. What kind of animal is Gerald?
- 4. Have you ever been on a safari trip?
- 5. What was your favorite part of the book?
- 6. What makes you want to dance?

Story Review:

To review with the children, I will ask them what animals were in the jungle that Gerald was in. I will know that the children are listening and paying attention by the way they are sitting and whether or not they are looking at me and participating. Overall, I will ask if they liked the book and what about the book did they like.
